- Abstract –** This is collection of research-oriented materials on Philippine history, politics, culture, and society that Mr. Netzorg collected as personal holdings during his careers as bibliographer, book dealer, and scholar of the Philippines. Primary focus is on the American period (1898-1946), Japanese occupation and the World War II era (1942-1945), and Philippine self-rule as a republic (1946-present; collection contains items through 1996).

Biographical Notes –

Morton Jacob (Jock) Netzorg was born in 1912 in Nueva Caceres (now Naga City), Camarines Sur, Philippines. His mother, Katherine Cornelia Netzorg (1884-1949), and his father, Morton Isadore Netzorg (1884-1946), came to the Philippines in 1911 to teach in the Philippine public schools as part of the Tomasites teacher corps. Morton Jacob, called by most "Jock" (a Filipinization of his nickname "Jake"), grew up primarily in Manila, although he lived in Baguio in northern Luzon for a year and a half while he was a boy. He had two siblings - David Leon, and Leah. The family soon became prominent and active members of the Manila Jewish community, public figures, and business owners. In the 1930s Morton I. worked on bringing European Jewish refugees to the Philippines as the Jewish Refugee Committee secretary.

Morton J. attended Manila Central School through his high school graduation. His first career was with Luzon Stevedoring Company working long hours at the docks in Manila Bay, and he eventually became a department manager there supervising 300 longshoremen. Tiring of the ceaseless hours of dock work, he left and worked for short stints as a trader at the Manila Stock Exchange, terminal foreman for Acoje chromite mine, refrigerator sales & service at Heacock's Department Store, and taught at his mother's school in Manila.

After the Japanese forces occupied Manila on January 2, 1942, Morton I. and Katherine were imprisoned in the Santo Tomas internment camp. They were liberated by the American forces in February 1945. David L. Netzorg, who was a military pilot, died of malaria in 1942 at Camp O'Donnell, a Japanese POW

camp in Tarlac. Leah (married name Stine) resided in the United States.

Adventurous and impetuous, Morton J. Netzorg had left Manila in February, 1940, bound for Vietnam, China and Japan. Japanese aggression across East Asia in that year made for perilous travel. He finally arrived in Japan just as the winds of war sent nearly all foreigners fleeing. He managed to find passage to San Francisco by working as a crew member on an American passenger liner.

Morton J. Netzorg arrived in the United States in 1941 before the start of American involvement in the war. There he met Hannelore "Floh" Fuld (born in 1923), a Jewish emigrant from Berlin, Germany. Hannelore subsequently changed her name to Petra and was known as **Petra Fuld Netzorg** ("Pete") for the rest of her life. After a whirlwind three-day courtship, Morton J. and Petra were married in 1941 and had two children, David (born in 1943) and Susan (born in 1946).

Morton had a voracious appetite for knowledge which he fed through reading. The Netzorgs started in the bookselling business as much to clear the clutter of books in their home as to gain part-time income. Cellar Book Shop was formed in New York in February, 1946, and the Netzorgs devoted their life to managing it. In the 1950s the Netzorgs settled in Detroit, Michigan. Cellar Book Shop by now was specializing in material published in and about the South East Asia region and the Philippines and the Pacific Islands in particular, as well as East and South Asia, and Africa. Their business became an essential source of material dedicated to these regions.

Morton acquired books, maps, journals, manuscripts, and other Filipiniana material from around the world and shipped them to Detroit. He built the largest

collection of Philippine children's books and textbooks. Morton himself became an important bibliographer and documentarian of the Philippines. He published articles in scholarly journals in the U.S., Philippines, and elsewhere. Morton was sought out as a resource person, editor, speaker, scholar, and contributor on Philippine and Southeast Asian history and affairs in many forums. He authored a number of important Filipiniana bibliographies and bibliographical essays, notably about children's literature and about the World War II period in the Philippines: *The Philippines in World War II and to Independence (December 8, 1941-July 4, 1946): An Annotated Bibliography* (Cornell University Press, 1977; Cellar Book Shop Press, 1995); *Backward, Turn Backward: A Study of Books for Children in the Philippines, 1866-1945* (National Book Store, 1985); *E. J. Halsema, Colonial Engineer: A Biography* (Cellar Book Shop Press, 1991); and his memoir, *Jock Netzorg: Manila Memories* (Pacific Rim Books, 1988).

Morton J. Netzorg died in 1995. Petra Fuld Netzorg continued running the Cellar Book Shop for a few years until her retirement. She died in 2008.

Edwin Bingham (E. B.) Copeland was an American professor (University of California-Berkeley), author (*The Coconut* and *Rice*, both published by MacMillan & Co.) who was a technical advisor on agricultural matters in the Philippines in 1932.

Donn V. Hart (1918–1983) was a 20th century American scholar and researcher who focused on Philippine Studies. He was a close friend of Morton J. Netzorg, and the two shared articles, books, and drafts amongst each other for edits and comment, including drafts of Hart's 1977 book, *Compadrinazgo: Ritual kinship in the Philippines* (Northern Illinois University Press).

Douglas A. MacArthur, an Army general who commanded U. S. Army Forces in the Far East from the Philippines and Australia during World War II. He directed a strategic delaying retreat down the Bataan Peninsula to Corregidor until President Roosevelt ordered his evacuation to Australia in 1942. MacArthur famously vowed to the Filipino people, "I shall return." Return he did, landing on Leyte in 1944 with the Sixth Army to eventually recapture the Philippines from Japanese forces.

Ferdinand E. Marcos was President of the Philippines from 1965-1986. He declared martial law in 1972, citing threats of insurgencies by Filipino communists and Muslim groups. Civil rights and press freedom were severely curtailed during this period. Corruption and the assassination of political rival Benigno Aquino Jr. led to the 1986 "People's Power" revolution, which forced Marcos into exile in Hawaii.

Verne E. Miller was an American from New Jersey who went to the Philippines in the early 1900s and became the supervising teacher at Laoag, Philippines.

Jose Rizal, a 19th century Filipino doctor, scholar, poet, author, artist, and reformist patriot, famously wrote books (including *Noli Me Tangere* and *El Filibusterismo*) critical of Spanish rule and abuses by the friars. He was executed by the Spanish in Manila in 1896 for treason, never seeing independence for the country he cherished. Rizal is considered by most Filipinos to be their national hero.

Russell Suter was an administrator from the U.S. serving in the Office of the Supervisor in Surigao, Cavite, and Manila in 1902-1904.

Gregorio F. Zaide was a Filipino historian, researcher, scholar, and author in the 20th century. He authored

67 books and some 500 articles on various subjects of Philippine history and cultural history.

Scope and Contents

The collection consists of nearly 24 cubic feet of printed historical, cultural, and administrative materials collected about the Philippines by Netzorg from published and unpublished sources. It includes bibliographic records about Filipiniana books, book chapters, manuscripts, articles, newsletters, theses, reports, personal narratives, and ephemera. There are limited collections of correspondence and diaries as noted below. Materials are described to the folder level and in many cases, to the item level in order to facilitate searching.

Materials are arranged into nine series, as follows:

Series 1: American presence in the Philippines, 1898-1941. Series contains materials concerning military, political, administrative and social functions of American colonial rule in the Philippines. Materials consist of articles, books and book chapters, military and administrative records, pamphlets, speeches, diary, reports, scrapbook, ephemera, and personal narratives. Arranged chronologically within six sub-series as follows:

Sub-series 1: The Spanish-American War (1898) and the Battle of Manila Bay (1898). (1898-1899). Articles, pamphlets, and speeches regarding the military campaigns that led to U.S. territorial claim to the Philippines, arranged chronologically. 2 folders.

Sub-series 2: US Military Presence in the Philippines. (1898-1939, bulk 1898-1905). Articles, correspondence, book, reports, and personal narratives of U.S. military operations fighting Filipino insurgents. Arranged chronologically into 7 folders.

Sub-series 3: US Colonial Presence in the Philippines. (1898-1941). Records of the U.S. political, administrative, and governing presence in the Philippines from the Spanish-American War of 1898 until the outbreak of World War II in 1941. Articles, serigraphs, book excerpts and chapters, pamphlets, reports, congressional proceedings, and speeches. Arranged chronologically. 15 folders.

Sub-series 4: Edwin Bingham Copeland. (1908, 1932). Correspondence, press clippings, research notes, and ephemera. Arranged chronologically in 1 folder.

Sub-series 5: Verne E. Miller. (1884-1923, bulk 1884-1899). School records from elementary and high school in New Jersey, college records

from Rutgers College (now University), correspondence, social and event invitations, and ephemera. 1 folder.

Sub-series 6: Russell Suter. (1902-1904). Correspondence, primarily to his family, and personal narrative travelling from the U.S. to Manila in 1902, through 1904. 1 folder.

Series 2: The World War II era in the Philippines, 1941-1946. Series contains materials concerning military and guerrilla operations in the Philippines from US, Philippine, and Japanese units, including war-crimes and collaboration charges. Articles, reports, theses, correspondence, books and book chapters, booklets, pamphlets, periodicals, newsletters, diaries, manuscripts, and personal narratives. Arranged as follows into 10 sub-series:

Sub-series 1: World War II commentary from non-military sources.

(1941-1995, bulk 1941-1946). Articles, theses, book excerpt, pamphlets about World War II in the Philippines, arranged chronologically. 11 folders.

Sub-series 2: World War II commentary from military sources. (1942-1945, 1962). Official US military reports, correspondence, booklets and pamphlets pertaining to World War II in the Philippines, arranged chronologically. 8 folders.

Sub-series 3: The 1942 defense of Bataan and Corregidor. (1947, 1951-1952, 1957-1971, 1975, 1979). Articles, reports, commemorative booklet, thesis, and newsletter of survivors group, *The Quan*. Arranged chronologically into 5 folders.

Sub-series 4: The 1942 Bataan Death March. (1959, 1961, 1964, 1967, 1982, 1984). Reports, articles, and pamphlet about the infamous forced march of surrendered American and Filipino soldiers to prison camps. Arranged chronologically. 1 folder.

Sub-series 5: General Douglas MacArthur. (1943-1980). Articles, book reviews, correspondence, and report. Arranged chronologically in 1 folder.

Sub-series 6: General Jonathan Wainwright. (1946, 1953). Articles, arranged chronologically. 1 folder.

Sub-series 7: Japanese Imperial Army. (1941-1946, 1976). Reports, articles, booklets (many propaganda-related) from Japanese forces in the Philippines, arranged chronologically. 1 folder.

Sub-series 8: War crimes and treason. (1945-1946, 1953, 1965-1966, 1972, 1984). Articles, trial transcript, interrogations about war crimes and collaboration with the Japanese occupying forces, arranged chronologically. 1 folder.

Sub-series 9: Internment camps and prisoner-of-war (POW) camps. (1942-1984). Articles, reports, newsletters, and speech about military and civilian personnel interred by the Japanese. (Note: personal narratives are included in Sub-series 10, below). Arranged alphabetically by camp name, and then chronologically within folders. 9 folders.

Sub-series 10: Personal narratives. (1942-1995). Diaries, transcripts, manuscripts, books and book chapters written by civilians and military personnel fighting, or held captive by, Japanese forces. Arranged alphabetically by author into 29 folders.

Series 3: Philippine History and Culture. (1785-1996). Series contains books, book excerpts, manuscripts, theses, articles, newsletters, conference papers, event programs, speeches, and ephemera pertaining to Philippine studies, not elsewhere arranged. Netzorg collected some materials by subject, some by author, and a large contingent of loose or individual materials has been arranged by year of creation. Arranged as follows into seven subseries:

Sub-series 1: Materials collected by subjects. (1887-1994; bulk 1965-1979). Books and book excerpts, articles, theses, brochures, newsletters, poems, sheet music, event programs, and maps. Arranged alphabetically into 19 folders.

Sub-series 2: Materials collected by author. (1901-1987; bulk 1952-1978). Books, articles, theses, conference papers, correspondence. Arranged alphabetically into 67 folders.

Sub-series 3: Materials arranged by year. (1785-1994; bulk 1950-1982). Books and book excerpts, pamphlets, articles, newsletters. Arranged chronologically into 26 folders.

Sub-series 4: Archival indexes and finding aids. (1967). Indexes of microfilm records in archives about the Philippines. Arranged alphabetically. 4 folders.

Sub-series 5: Ephemera. (1862-ca. 1980s; bulk 1941-1978). Event programs, radio play scripts, campaign materials, correspondence, legal documents, stock certificate, and family tree. Arranged chronologically into 3 folders.

Sub-series 6: Rizaliana. (Materials about José Rizal; undated, 1887-1900, 1932, 1961, 1977). Books and book excerpts, pamphlets, articles, brochures. 1 folder.

Sub-series 7: Donn V. Hart. (1955-1987; bulk 1960-1978). Sub-series consisting of articles, books, pamphlets in draft and published form; correspondence, research materials, and a copy of Hart's

personal library card catalog contents. Arranged chronologically and alphabetically into 17 folders.

Series 4: Non-governmental organizations and associations and the Philippines. (1950-1993). Series contains articles, reports, brochures, bulletins, newsletters, ephemera, and organizational records relating to non-governmental organizations either operating in the Philippines or concerning the Philippines. Arranged alphabetically by association name. No sub-series. 55 folders.

Series 5: Philippine Government and Politics, 1898-1998. Series consists of articles, government publications, speeches, reports, conference papers, decrees, and administrative records relating to Philippine public officials operating in the course of their official duties. Materials are arranged as follows into four sub-series:

Sub-series 1: Philippine government and politics. (1898, 1932-1935, 1945-1961, 1967-1988, 1997, 1998) Articles, research notes and materials pertaining to government and politics, primarily in the post-war period as an independent republic. Arranged chronologically. 3 folders.

Sub-series 2: Philippine government publications. (1901, 1903, 1909, 1926-1928, 1935-1940, 1951-1956, 1959-1968, 1972-1977, 1980; bulk 1951-1977). Official publications of Philippine government bureaus and agencies, primarily in the post-war period as an independent republic. Arranged alphabetically by subject area, then chronologically within folders. 7 folders.

Sub-series 3: Political speeches. (1909-1914, 1922-1927, 1933-1950; bulk 1945-1950). Speeches of government officials in their official capacity; primarily presidential addresses. Arranged alphabetically by last name, and then chronologically within folder. 6 folders.

Sub-series 4: Ferdinand E. Marcos. (1965, 1972-1977, 1982, 1984-1988; bulk 1984-1987). Articles, pamphlets, event invite, decrees, newsletters, reports, conference paper. Arranged chronologically in 1 folder.

Series 6: Philippine Languages and Dictionaries 1892-1991. Series consists of published and unpublished dictionaries, scholarly articles, phrase books, workbooks and lesson plans for various languages and dialects used in the Philippines. Series is arranged as follows in two sub-series:

Sub-series 1: Dictionaries and workbooks. (Undated, 1892, 1893, ca. 1900, 1921, ca. 1940s, 1943, 1957, 1962). Published and unpublished dictionaries, phrase books, vocabulary guides, workbooks, and

written exercises. Arranged alphabetically by name of Filipino language or dialect. 9 folders.

Sub-series 2: Philippine languages, dialects, and linguistics. (Undated, 1913, 1939-1943, 1953-1958, 1960-1965, 1972-1981, 1991; bulk 1962-1964). Published and unpublished articles and reports, arranged chronologically. 3 folders.

Series 7: Bibliographies, the Zaide Library, and Bookstore Catalogs, 1941-1990.

Series contains articles, books, manuscripts, series, newsletters, pamphlets, and catalogs, all pertaining to bookstores and research materials. Arranged as follows in three sub-series:

Sub-series 1: Bibliographies. (Undated, 1944-1989; bulk 1950s, 1970, 1980s). Published and unpublished bibliographies in the form of monographs, articles, and manuscripts, generally dealing with SE Asian and Philippine Studies. Arranged chronologically within subject folders. 6 folders.

Sub-series 2: The Gregorio F. Zaide Library. (Undated). Copy of the card catalog of the Zaide Library, arranged chronologically; also a finding aid for the contents of Zaide's filing cabinets. 1 folder.

Sub-series 3: Bookstore Catalogs. (Undated, 1941, 1964-1968, 1970-1977, 1989, 1998). Catalogs and price lists from U.S. and Philippine bookstores carrying Filipiniana books. Arranged alphabetically into 2 folders.

Series 8: Other Southeast Asia and Africa Studies. (1949, 1950, 1962-1963, 1977, 1979). Series consists of materials collected about Burma (now Myanmar), East Africa, Indonesia, Malaysia (Peninsular), and Malaysia (Sabah). Contains books and book excerpts, articles, newsletters, and reports, arranged alphabetically by country. No sub-series. 1 folder.

Series 9: The Netzorg Family Papers and Collections, 1933-1990. Series contains of Netzorg family correspondence, catalogs and business records relating to The Cellar Book Shop, publications written by Morton J. Netzorg, and two large scrapbooks of Philippine-related ephemera collected by the Netzorg family.

Series is arranged as follows into four sub-series:

Sub-series 1: Netzorg family correspondence. (Undated, 1933, 1952-1956, 1960, 1966, 1972-1976, 1979, , 1980, 1986, 1990) Letters and notes primarily about books and other publications. Arranged chronologically into 2 folders.

Sub-series 2: Morton J. Netzorg publications. (1966, 1969, 1981, 1982, 1986). Journal articles and conference materials written by Morton J. Netzorg. Arranged chronologically. 1 folder.

Sub-series 3: The Cellar Book Shop, Inc. (Undated, 1953, 1955, 1960-1963, ca. 1960s, 1987). Catalogs, price lists, newsletters, and article, arranged chronologically. 3 folders.

Sub-series 4: The Netzorg Ephemera collection. (1848-1986, bulk 1898-1930). Scrapbooks containing letters, articles, clippings, and various ephemeral items relating to the Philippines, especially U.S. presence since 1898. Contains some Netzorg family ephemera. 2 folders.
